

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Superintendent's Message:

January 7, 2021

Dear Salt Lake City School District community,

I wanted to touch base with you on a couple of important topics.

First, I want to acknowledge the devastating events that unfolded yesterday in our nation's capital and even here at our own state capitol building. Many of our students may have watched these events in the news and on social media with great concern. (I know I did.) As educators, we work hard to teach children that violence is never the way to solve conflicts. It is important for us as parents and as educators to convey to our students that this violence is

not what our country stands for. Democracy matters, and we each play an important part in preserving it.

As our students process what they've witnessed, they may have a lot of questions. The National Association of School Psychologists has put together a comprehensive guide with tips for parents and teachers to talk with children about violence. You can find the guide below in several languages:

Thank you for helping us continue to teach our students that violence is never the answer, that we can disagree with others respectfully, and that civic engagement continues to be more important than ever in 2021.

I also want to share some outcomes from this week's Board of Education meeting. I mentioned I'd be [making a proposal](#) to the Board regarding an in-person learning option for secondary students. The Board voted to tie the start of this in-person learning option to the availability of COVID-19 vaccinations for teachers and front-line school employees. At this time, we don't know exactly when those vaccinations will be available, but we remain optimistic that we'll have that information soon. Once we have confirmed vaccination dates, the Board can determine when the in-person learning option for secondary students will begin.

The Board of Education has also asked that I gather information for the next Board meeting and report on the mental health services available to students. We know online learning has impacted students in different ways, and I look forward to reporting on the mental health resources we offer to help support students and their families during the pandemic and beyond.

COVID-19 Parent Symptom Guide

Should your student come to school today?

Children who are sick should not go to school. **Parents are being asked to check their students for symptoms of Covid-19 every day before sending their student to school.** This quick assessment can help parents determine if their student should attend school or stay home and follow up with a healthcare professional.

Symptoms	
Does your child have any of these symptoms?	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Fever or temperature of 100.4° F (38° C) or higher. If you do not have a thermometer, check your child’s skin to see if it feels warm or is red, or ask if they have chills or are sweaty. • Cough – If your child normally has a cough because of allergies or asthma, is this cough different than normal? • Shortness of breath • Muscle aches or pains not explained by exercise or activity • Decrease in sense of smell or taste • New runny nose • Sore throat • Nausea or vomiting • Diarrhea 	
<p>Yes, my child has at least one of those symptoms</p>	<p>No, my child is sick, but does not have any of the symptoms listed above.</p>
<p>Your child should isolate at home, and not go to school until they have seen a healthcare provider.</p> <p>Your child may need to get tested for COVID-19.</p> <p>Students may return to school when:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • At least 10 days has passed since the first symptom appeared, symptoms have improved, and there has been no fever for at least 24 hours without the use of fever reducing medication. OR • Students have a note from a healthcare professional containing another diagnosis. OR • Students have a negative COVID-19 test. 	<p>Keep children home until they have been symptom free for 24 hours.
