Extended Learning Opportunities:

Alternative to Grade 4 Universal Assessment – Universal Choice

As part of the Salt Lake City School District's ongoing commitment to meet the unique learning needs of its students, the Extended Learning Program (ELP) is available at all district elementary and middle schools in grades 4-8. Students who demonstrate high academic ability or potential are identified for this program. Students in grade 5-8 are currently identified for the Neighborhood Extended Learning Program (NELP).

At the beginning of this school year a universal assessment was planned for students in grade 4 and new-to-district grades 5 and 6. These students would be given the opportunity to take an online CogAT Screening, a cognitive abilities test to assess their ability to learn new tasks and solve complex problems.

We are unable to administer this assessment during remote learning, so the Extended Learning Program will use the following strategies to serve students who desire more depth, complexity, inquiry, and challenge, in addition to their general education studies.

In the absence of universal testing for grade 4 students, there will be a Canvas Course developed and maintained by NELP teachers that will give students a universal choice to participate with resources which will include more depth, complexity, and challenge.

Once students return to school buildings, the universal assessment will be administered and identified students will be offered NELP placement. This may not be available until grade 5.

NELP access for students in grade 4 in Remote Learning:

- All grade 4 students will have a NELP Course available to them in CANVAS.
 - o All grade 4 students will be given opportunities to complete work on their own time through the 4th Grade Discovery Course
 - o Any grade 4 student who chooses to participate in projects and lessons that are offered will have access to the NELP teacher. The homeroom classroom teacher will inform the NELP teacher that a student needs these resources.
 - o Lessons and activities will be uploaded on student's Canvas Dashboard under 4th Grade Discovery.

COVID-19 Parent Symptom Guide

Should your student come to school today?

Children who are sick should not go to school. **Parents are being asked to check their students for symptoms of Covid-19 every day before sending their student to school**. This quick assessment can help parents determine if their student should attend school or stay home and follow up with a healthcare professional.

Symptoms

Does your child have any of these symptoms?

- Fever or temperature of 100.4° F (38° C) or higher. If you do not have a thermometer, check your child's skin to see if it feels warm or is red, or ask if they have chills or are sweaty.
- Cough If your child normally has a cough because of allergies or asthma, is this cough different than normal?
- Shortness of breath
- Muscle aches or pains not explained by exercise or activity
- Decrease in sense of smell or taste
- New runny nose
- Sore throat
- Nausea or vomiting
- Diarrhea

No, my child is sick, but does not have any of the symptoms listed above.

Your child should isolate at home, and not go to school until they have seen a healthcare provider.

Your child may need to get tested for COVID-19.

Students may return to school when:

- At least 10 days has passed since the first symptom appeared, symptoms have improved, and there has been no fever for at least 24 hours without the use of fever reducing medication. OR
- Students have a note from a healthcare professional containing another diagnosis. OR
- Students have a negative COVID-19 test.

Keep children home until they have been symptom free for 24 hours.

See a doctor right away, if your child does not seem to be getting better or is getting worse.

Information from Superintendent Madden:

Yesterday afternoon, Salt Lake City Mayor Erin Mendenhall made an announcement moving Salt Lake City to the "Yellow" phase of Utah's COVID-19 recovery plan. Please know this does not change our plan to start the year with remote learning. Our Board of Education voted on the following parameters for returning to in-person learning:

- New COVID-19 cases need to fall below 10 new cases per 100,000 citizens in Salt Lake County.
- The COVID-19 positive test rate needs to be below 5% in Salt Lake County.

We still haven't met those parameters. Currently, Salt Lake County is at 13.3 cases per 100,000 citizens, and the COVID positive test rate is currently at 8.95%, according to the Salt Lake County Health Department.

We are looking forward to seeing students online on Tuesday, and I have a few updates for you as the start of school draws closer.

CANVAS VIDEOS FOR PARENTS

MEALS FOR STUDENTS

Thanks to a last-minute waiver granted by the United States Department of Agriculture, the Salt Lake City School District (SLCSD) will once again resume "Grab and Go Meal Service" at 16 designated school sites. Children can receive a "Lunch Today, Breakfast Tomorrow" combo meal each weekday from Sept. 3, 2020 through Oct. 30, 2020.

To help ensure safety, all meals will be prepared, packaged and delivered by SLCSD staff directly to each family's vehicle. For those without a vehicle, walk-up service is also available. Meals for those with specific needs will be made available upon request. Contact our registered dietician, Brianna Hardisty, to determine site location and make additional arrangements, as needed (Brianna.Hardisty@slcschools.org).

This food service program is open to the public. Free/reduced meal benefit status and school enrollment is not a requirement. These meals will be provided daily, free of charge, to ALL children ages 0 to 18.

PPE GUIDELINES

We have received many questions about face shields and masks when meeting with other employees or families and students. According to the Mask Order issued by Utah Governor Gary Herbert and the Utah Coronavirus Task Force,

- To be the most effective, teachers and school employees need to wear face masks when meeting with other employees or families and students.
- Face shields are not a substitute for face masks but may be used in addition to a face mask.
 - o Certain exceptions may be made based on individual student learning needs.
- A cloth face covering can be used as a face mask if it:
 - o Covers the nose and mouth without openings that can be seen through
 - o Is made of synthetic or natural fabrics
 - o Secures under the chin
 - o Fits snugly against the nose and sides of the face
 - o Does not have an exhalation valve or vent



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STUDENT COMPUTERS UPDATE

We know there are a lot of questions about student devices. Demand for student devices has been extremely high. We have checked out 50-60% more devices than what was requested by parents during Online Registration. Global supply chain delays also mean that 6,000 laptops are on back order.

We know some of our schools have run out of devices, but the district is working with suppliers to send us about 1,300 devices **next week**, and more will be coming in the following weeks. School will contact families when devices arrive, **but the soonest they will start arriving is next week**.

I have been impressed by many of the ways our schools are reaching out to families. The small group meetings; the parent and student orientations, some outside on football fields or playgrounds; the school parades; and especially the home visits are really making a difference. I know the work is hard, but it is worth it. I can't wait for school to start next week.
