#### COVID-19 Parent Symptom Guide

#### Should your student come to school today?

Children who are sick should not go to school. **Parents are being asked to check their students for symptoms of Covid-19 every day before sending their student to school**. This quick assessment can help parents determine if their student should attend school or stay home and follow up with a healthcare professional.

Symptoms	
Does your child have any of these symptoms?	
<ul> <li>Fever or temperature of 100.4° F (38° C) or higher. If you do not have a thermometer, check your child's skin to see if it feels warm or is red, or ask if they have chills or are sweaty.</li> <li>Cough – If your child normally has a cough because of allergies or asthma, is this cough different than normal?</li> <li>Shortness of breath</li> <li>Muscle aches or pains not explained by exercise or activity</li> <li>Decrease in sense of smell or taste</li> <li>New runny nose</li> <li>Sore throat</li> <li>Nausea or vomiting</li> <li>Diarrhea</li> </ul>	
Yes, my child has at least one of those symptoms	<b>No</b> , my child is sick, but does not have any of the symptoms listed above.
<ul> <li>Your child should isolate at home, and not go to school until they have seen a healthcare provider.</li> <li>Your child may need to get tested for COVID-19.</li> <li>Students may return to school when:</li> <li>At least 10 days has passed since the first symptom appeared, symptoms have improved, and there has been no fever for at least 24 hours without the use of fever reducing medication. OR</li> <li>Students have a note from a healthcare professional containing another diagnosis. OR</li> <li>Students have a negative COVID-19 test.</li> </ul>	Keep children home until they have been symptom free for 24 hours. See a doctor right away, if your child does not seem to be getting better or is getting worse. #### Dear families,

The priority of the Salt Lake City School District is the health and safety of our students, families, and employees. This summer, the Board of Education used data from the Salt Lake County Health Department and other public health experts to select specific metrics that would determine when it was safe to return to in-person learning in some capacity:

- a COVID-19 positive test rate in Salt Lake County below 5% for seven consecutive days, and
- a COVID-19 positive case count of fewer than 10 per 100,000 residents of Salt Lake County.

On July 30, the Board of Education used these metrics when they voted to begin the school year in remote learning for the first quarter of the year. They also committed to revisiting Salt Lake City's COVID-19 status at midterm and at the end of each quarter to determine if it was safe to return to in-person learning.

Over the last seven days, Salt Lake County has had:

- a COVID-19 positive test rate of <u>11.61%</u>, (from September 20-27, 2020) and
- a COVID-19 positive case count of <u>32.1 per 100,000 residents</u> of Salt Lake County (as of yesterday, September 28, 2020).

As we approach the first midterm checkpoint, **Salt Lake City has not met the metrics** the Board selected to return to inperson learning. Therefore, we will continue in remote learning through the end of the first quarter, which ends on November 9.

The Board of Education will discuss plans for the second quarter at upcoming board meetings on October 6, October 20, and November 3. On October 6, I will provide a report to the Board regarding the meeting last week with district leadership and the Salt Lake County Health Department. District leaders, in coordination with the Salt Lake County Health Department, continue to work on plans for a safe return to in-person learning. As the COVID-19 situation improves, our first planning focus will be on returning younger grades to in-person learning in phases and expanding flexibility for small group instruction for classes that require in-person skill development.

You will receive a survey on Wednesday, September 30, asking for feedback about your family's remote learning experience during the first weeks of school. **The survey will come from Dr. Michelle Amiot, Director of Assessment and Evaluation (<u>Michelle.Amiot@slcschools.org</u>).** Parents will receive a separate email for each child attending school in the Salt Lake City School District. The survey will be open through Monday, October 5.

Please note there is an independent group called Parent Voices that has been circulating their own survey to our school district community. This survey is not affiliated with the Salt Lake City School District.

#### U.S. CENSUS DEADLINE IS LESS THAN TWO WEEKS AWAY

Every 10 years, the federal government conducts a census to count the population in the United States and five U.S. territories. The census provides critical data that lawmakers, business owners, teachers, and many others use to provide daily services, products, and support for you and your community. Every year, billions of dollars in federal funding go to schools, hospitals, fire departments, roads, and other resources based on census data.

Your participation in the 2020 Census is critical to support our students, our schools, and our community. An accurate census provides increased funding for our schools, including funding for

- high poverty schools,
- student meals,
- adult education, and
- preschool education.

This year, the Census is available online. When you respond to the Census, your answers are kept anonymous. By law, the Census Bureau cannot release any identifiable information about you, your home, or your business, even to law enforcement agencies.

**Please make sure you fill out the Census online by going to** <u>my2020census.gov</u>. And encourage your students' families to do the same. But hurry! The 2020 Census ends on September 30.
